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# CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

In 2013, the global economic and political environment remained complicated, difficult and challenging in various areas. However, the Group, with full confidence in its future development and strategies, including our continuous transformation and upgrading, was going at full speed and has achieved business growth during the year. The Chinese market remains to be the Group's most powerful growth engine.

- Revenue for the year increased from HK\$2.61 billion to HK\$2.81 billion, representing an increase of 7%
- Net profit for the year increased from HK\$170 million to HK\$194 million
- Basic earnings per share were HK\$0.65
- Net asset value per share was HK\$8.9
- Proposed final dividend per share is HK\$0.15 and the total dividend for the year will be HK\$0.20 per share

As the world's number one silk enterprise, High Fashion will continue to focus its mission to develop China's silk industry. We have developed a unique High Fashion Silk World, highlighting our cutting-edge silk technologies and exquisite silk products. It further expands into the vast China's silk market by promoting the development of the silk cultural and tourism industries, the silk-themed shopping malls, as well as the related real estate development. We firmly believe that the mission of High Fashion as the world's number one silk enterprise will bring long-term and substantial contributions to the Group.

During the period, we have established a professional and outstanding team of new media, which went into operation in early 2014. It will fully integrate with the powerful strength of High Fashion as the world's number one silk enterprise for online sales of our fashionable silk products and gifts. Meanwhile, it will support the Group in promoting the development of the silk cultural and tourism industries, and bringing online transactions to facilitate the sales of our major fashion brands of the Group, including theme, csIr and August Silk.



I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the shareholders, banks, customers, suppliers and our fellow Directors for their support and precious opinions. I would also like to thank the management team and all staff members of the Group for their dedication and contributions.

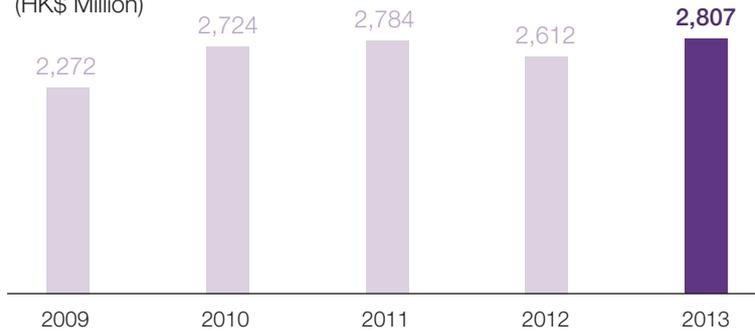

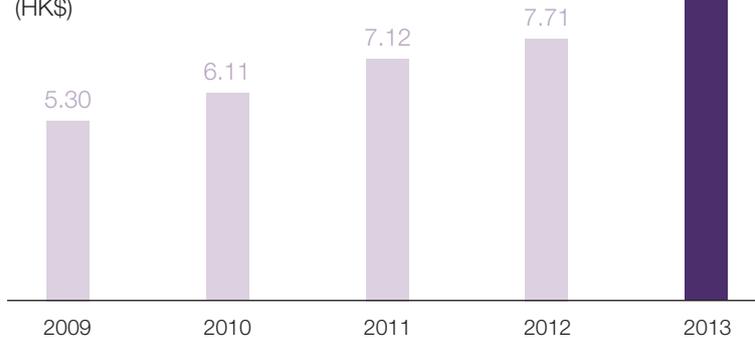
## Turnover

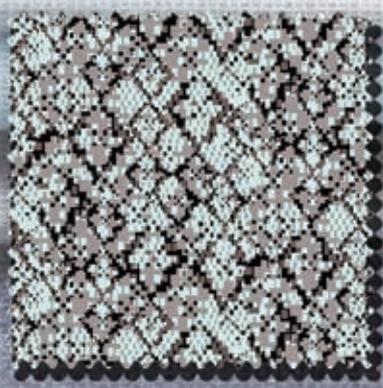
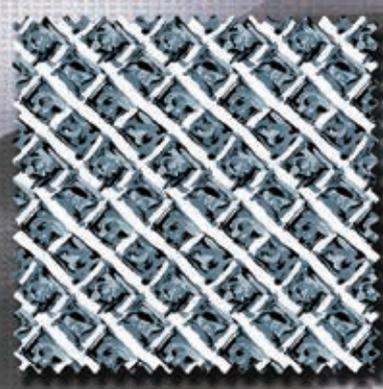
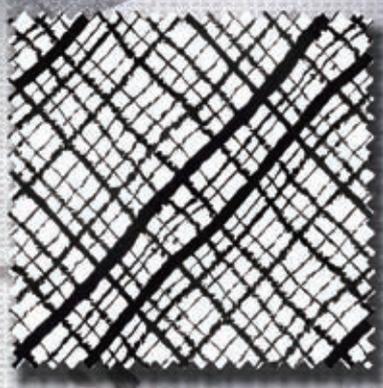

# MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

## RESULTS

Revenue for the year ended 31 December 2013 was HK\$2.81 billion. Net profit attributable to shareholders for the year ended 31 December 2013 was HK\$194 million, compared with a profit of HK\$170 million of 2012, up 14%. Basic earnings per share were HK\$0.65, up 14%. Net asset value per share increased from HK\$7.7 to HK\$8.9.

In spite of the immense inflationary pressure with rising raw material costs and other operational overheads, the Group continued to deliver solid results in our manufacturing export business, through implementation of a series of effective measures to enhance our efficiency and competitiveness over the years to capture the higher end market.

The profit for the 2013 included an exceptional gain on fair value change of derivative financial instruments of HK\$18.5 million (2012: gain of HK\$38.8 million), which is the financial instruments for hedging RMB for the

year from 2013 to 2015 and an increase in fair value of investment properties (before tax) of HK\$158 million (2012: HK\$106 million).



## LIQUIDITY AND FINANCIAL RESOURCES

The Group's total outstanding bank borrowings were increased to HK\$2,536 million at the end of reporting period compared to HK\$1,846 million as at 31 December 2012. The increase in bank borrowing was mainly due to our hedging arrangement during the year. Our gearing ratio of non-current liabilities to shareholders' funds was only 12% at the end of reporting period. Current ratio has been maintained at a healthy level of 1.27.

The Group's total cash and bank balances were HK\$2,699 million at the end of reporting period compared to HK\$2,097 million as at 31 December 2012. Based on the net cash position and the ample banking facilities available, the Group had a very strong working capital and liquidity to meet the operating needs and future growth.

The Group's trade receivables were mainly denominated in US dollar. Bank borrowings were denominated in US dollar and Hong Kong dollar. Since the Hong Kong dollar is pegged to the US dollar, the Group considers that its foreign exchange risk is minimal. The Group has taken conservative approach to handle foreign currency risk with adequate hedging reserve. The Group had no borrowings at fixed interest rates during the year.

The Group has no material contingent liabilities. Barring the pledge of trade receivables and bills receivables of certain subsidiaries of HK\$55 million, there were no charges on the Group's assets.

## TAX AUDIT

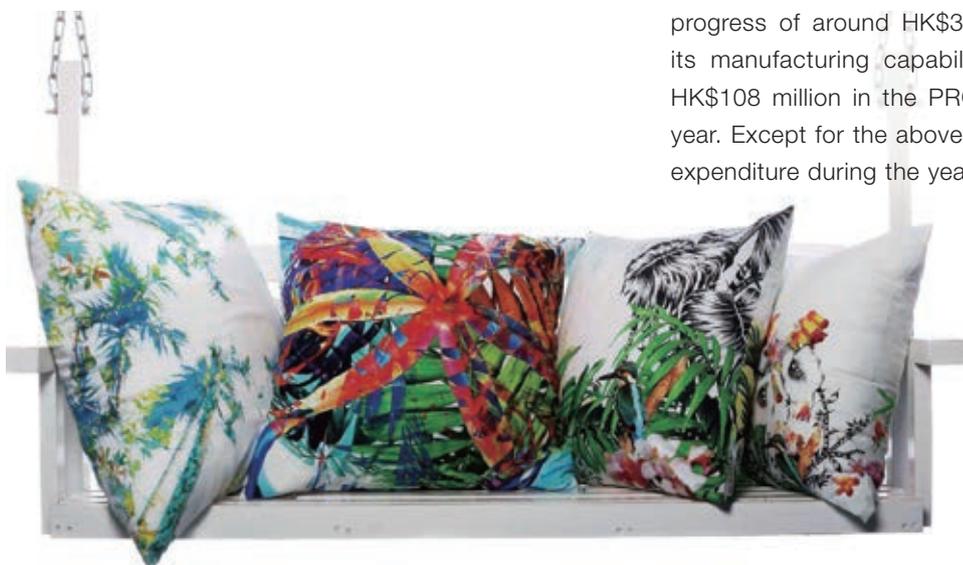
The Inland Revenue Department (IRD) initiated a tax audit on certain group companies in February 2006 for the years of assessment from 1999/2000 onwards. The management is of the opinion that, in all the years, adequate Hong Kong tax provisions were made on the Hong Kong sourced income. Since the tax audit is still at a fact-finding stage, the outcome of the tax audit cannot be readily ascertained. After consulting with professional advisers, the management is of the opinion that the existing provisions are adequate.

## HUMAN RESOURCES

The total number of employees of the Group including jointly controlled entities as at the end of the reporting period was about 8,600. Other than the competitive remuneration package offered to the employees, share options may also be granted to selected employees based on the Group's performance. No share options were granted to employees during the year.

## CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

The Group has purchased the plant and equipment and the leasehold improvement and construction in progress of around HK\$33 million in order to upgrade its manufacturing capabilities and acquired a land of HK\$108 million in the PRC for development during the year. Except for the above, there was no material capital expenditure during the year.

He has over 30 years of experience in manufacturing of apparel industry and marketing of brand and retail management. Mr. Lam is a substantial shareholder of the Company within the meaning of Part XV of the Securities and Futures Ordinance. He is the father of Mr. Lam Gee Yu, Will and Mr. Lam Din Yu, Well.

**Ms. SO Siu Hang, Patricia**, aged 55, joined the Group in 1990. Ms. So is an Executive Director of the Company and is responsible for the Group's strategic planning, implementation and global business development. She has an in-depth knowledge of the fashion apparel industry and has substantial experience in corporate management. She holds a bachelor degree in commerce and finance from the University of Toronto and a master degree in business administration from York University in Canada. Prior to joining the Group, she worked for Standard Chartered Bank for 4 years.

## NON-EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS

**Mr. CHAN Wah Tip, Michael**, aged 61, joined the Group as Company Secretary in 1992. Mr. Chan is a Non-executive Director, a member of the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee and Nomination Committee of the Company. Mr. Chan was an Independent Non-executive Director of the Company prior to his re-designation as a Non-executive Director of the Company in October 2004. He has been practising as a solicitor in Hong Kong for over 30 years. Mr. Chan is a consultant of Wilkinson & Grist which is the legal adviser of the Company. He was a non-executive director of Shougang Concord Technology Holdings Limited and an independent non-executive director of L.K. Technology Holdings Limited.

**Professor YEUNG Kwok Wing**, aged 66, joined the Group in 2000. Professor Yeung is a Non-executive Director, a member of the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee and Nomination Committee of the Company. He is currently the executive director of Clothing Industry Training Authority ("CITA") in Hong Kong. He holds a PhD from the Queen's University of Belfast, Northern Ireland. Professor Yeung specializes in textile product development, quality assurance and management and serves as various honorary fellows and members of international associations of textile, dyers and colorists as well. He has a long and distinguished academic career and was associated with The Hong Kong Polytechnic University ("PolyU") for more than 30 years before joining CITA in June 2006. His administrative ability is also highly appreciated in PolyU when he was posted as its vice president overseeing academic development from 2002 to 2005. He was an independent non-executive director of SRE Group Limited.

He is a member of The Association of Chartered Certified Accountants, the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

He is responsible for the product development of the Group and is the CEO of Advance Textile Centre of High Fashion (China) Co., Ltd., the supplier of finished fabrics and circular knit. He holds a diploma in business administration and a master in psychology from Padova University. Previously, he worked as a manager in the Benetton Group for more than 25 years and was responsible for various production units and sourcing divisions. **Mr. Nicholas E. G. WRIGHT**, aged 59, joined the Group in 1993. He is the Managing Director of High Fashion (U.K.) Limited. He has over 25 years of experience in the clothing industry.

## RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS

The Group's profit for the year ended 31 December 2013 and the statement of financial position of the Group at that date are set out in the consolidated financial statements on pages 39 to 126.

An interim dividend of 5 HK cents per ordinary share was paid on 3 October 2013. The Board has resolved to recommend a final dividend of 15 HK cents per share in respect of the year to shareholders on the register of members on 13 June 2014, making a total dividend for the year ended 31 December 2013 of 20 HK cents (2012: 20 HK cents) per share. The final dividend will be paid in cash, with the shareholders being given an option to elect to receive in respect of part or all of such dividend by way of scrip. A circular giving full details of the scrip dividend proposal and a form of election will be issued by the Company in due course.

There are no provisions for pre-emptive rights under the Company's bye-laws or the laws of Bermuda which would oblige the Company to offer new shares on a pro rata basis to its existing shareholders.

During the year, the Company had not redeemed, and neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries had purchased or sold any of the Company's listed securities.

## **DISTRIBUTABLE RESERVES**

At 31 December 2013, the Company's reserves available for distribution, calculated in accordance with the provisions of The Companies Act 1981 of Bermuda (as amended), amounted to HK\$200,178,000, of which HK\$44,582,000 has been proposed as final dividend for the year. In addition, the Company's share premium account, in the amount of HK\$262,871,000 may be distributed in the form of fully paid bonus shares.

## **CHARITABLE DONATIONS**

During the year, the Group made charitable donations totalling HK\$290,000 (2012: HK\$1,429,000).

## **MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS**

In the year under review, sales to the Group's five largest customers accounted for 30% of the total sales for the year and sales to the largest customer included therein amounted to 10.1%. Purchases from the Group's five largest suppliers accounted for less than 30% of the total purchases for the year.

At no time during the year have the directors, their associates or any shareholder of the Company (which to the knowledge of the directors owns more than 5% of the Company's share capital) had an interest in these major customers or suppliers.

The Company believes that good corporate governance provides a framework that is essential for effective management and enhancing shareholders’ value. The corporate governance principles of the Company emphasise a quality Board, sound internal controls, and accountability and transparency to all shareholders.

The Company has complied with all the code provisions of the Corporate Governance Code and Corporate Governance Report (the “CG Code”) as set out in Appendix 14 of the Listing Rules on the Stock Exchange throughout the accounting year ended 31 December 2013, except for the deviations as described below:

Mr. Lam Foo Wah is the Chairman and Managing Director of the Company. The Board considers that the function of the Chairman and the Managing Director in the Company’s strategic planning and development process are overlapping and it may not be for the benefit of the Company to have separate individuals occupying these two offices in the condition of the Group and its stage of development.
2. Under the code provision A.6.7 of the CG Code, independent non-executive directors and other non-executive directors, should attend general meetings and develop a balanced understanding of the views of shareholders. Due to other engagements away from Hong Kong, Mr. Leung Hok Lim (Independent non-executive Director) and Mr. Chan Wah Tip, Michael (Non-executive Director) were not able to attend the annual general meeting held on 28 May 2013.

The number of INEDs represents more than one-third of the Board. One of the three INEDs has appropriate professional qualifications, or accounting or related financial management expertise.

Review of the Board composition is made regularly to ensure that it has a balance of expertise, skills and experience appropriate for the requirements of the business of the Company.

Appropriate insurance cover on directors' and officers' liabilities has been in force to protect the Directors and officers of the Group from their risk exposure arising from the businesses of the Group.

### Board Meeting

During the year, four regular Board meeting were held for facilitating the function of the Board. In any event all Directors were available for consultation by management from time to time during the year.

In order to ensure that the Board is able to fulfill its responsibilities, it has established and delegated specific responsibilities to the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee and Nomination Committee. The details of the committees are stipulated on pages 28 to 31 of this report.

The Company provides at least 14 days' notices of every Board meeting to all Directors. Board papers are circulated not less than three days before the Board meetings to enable the Directors to make informed decisions on matters to be raised at the Board meetings.

During the financial year, the Group Chief Financial Officer and the Company Secretary attended the regular Board meetings to advise on corporate governance, statutory compliance, accounting and financial matters when necessary. Directors had full access to information on the Group and were able to seek independent professional advice whenever deemed necessary by the Directors. The Company Secretary prepared minutes and kept records of matters discussed and decisions resolved at all Board meetings.

### Nomination, Appointment and Re-election of Directors

The Company has established the Nomination Committee with specific terms of reference in March 2012 and formal nomination procedures were adopted. Any nomination of directors will be reviewed and discussed by the Nomination Committee for his suitability on the basis of qualifications, experience and background. Suitable candidates will be recommended by the Nomination Committee to the Board for consideration of the appointment.

In accordance with the Company's Bye-Laws, newly appointed director(s) is/are required to retire and can offer themselves for re-election at the first general meeting following their appointment.

At the meeting held on 26 March 2014, the Board approved the appointment of Messrs. Lam Gee Yu, Will and Lam Din Yu, Well as executive directors of the Company with effect from 1 April 2014. In accordance with bye-law 86(2) of the Company's Bye-laws, Messrs. Lam Gee Yu, Will and Lam Din Yu, Well will hold office until the forthcoming annual general meeting to be held on 6 June 2014 ("2014 AGM") and being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

The Company's Bye-Laws provide that every Director shall be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years and that one-third (or the number nearest to one-third) of the Directors shall retire from office every year at annual general meeting of the Company. Retiring Directors are eligible for re-election.

## THE BOARD (Cont'd)

### Nomination, Appointment and Re-election of Directors (Cont'd)

In accordance with bye-law 87 of the Company's Bye-laws, Mr. Leung Hok Lim, Mr. Lam Foo Wah and Mr. Wong Shiu Hoi, Peter will retire by rotation and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election at the forthcoming 2014 AGM.

None of the directors who are proposed for re-election at the forthcoming annual general meeting has a service contract with the Company which is not determinable by the Company within one year without payment of compensation, other than statutory compensation.

Pursuant to the code provision A.4.3 of CG Code, any further appointment of INED serving more than nine years should be subject to a separate resolution to be approved by shareholders. Mr. Leung Hok Lim and Mr. Wong Shiu Hoi, Peter are INED serving the Company since 2004. Mr. Leung and Mr. Wong have met the independence guidelines set out in Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules and have made an annual confirmation of independence to the Company. The Board is satisfied that Mr. Leung and Mr. Wong who served the Company for more than nine years, remains independent, and considers that they would be able to continue to discharge their duties as an INED to the Company. Mr. Leung and Mr. Wong should be re-elected and separate resolution will be proposed for their re-election at the 2014 AGM.

During the financial year, each of the INEDs has made an annual confirmation of independence pursuant to Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. The Company considers that all INEDs meet the independence guidelines set out in Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules and are independent.

## CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

The positions of the Chairman of the Board (“Chairman”) and the Managing Director are held and performed by Mr. Lam Foo Wah, the same individual. The Board considers that the function of the Chairman and the Managing Director in the Company’s strategic planning and development process are overlapping and it may not be for the benefit of the Company to have separate individuals occupying these two offices given the conditions of the Group and its stage of development.

The Board, led by the Chairman, is responsible for the approval and monitoring of the Group’s overall strategies and policies; evaluating the performance of the Group; and oversight of management. One of the important roles of the Chairman is to provide leadership to the Board to ensure that the Board acts in the best interests of the Group. The Chairman ensures that the Board works effectively and performs its responsibilities, and that all key and appropriate issues are discussed by the Board in a timely manner. All Directors have been consulted about any matters proposed for inclusion in the agenda. The Chairman has delegated the responsibility for drawing up the agenda for each Board meeting to the Company Secretary.

Management is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Group under the leadership of the Chairman who is also the Managing Director. The Managing Director, working with the other executive directors and the executive management team of each business division, is responsible for managing the businesses of the Group, including implementation of strategies adopted by the Board and assuming full accountability to the Board for the operations of the Group. All Directors have made full and active contribution to the affairs of the Board and it always acts in the best interests of the Group.

With the support from Executive Directors and the Company Secretary, the Chairman seeks to ensure that all Directors are properly briefed on issues arising at Board meetings and receives adequate and reliable information in a timely manner. Apart from the regular Board meetings, the Chairman hold meetings with the Non-executive Directors (including Independent Non-executive Directors) without the presence of Executive Directors.

## BOARD COMMITTEES

The Board delegates its powers and authorities from time to time to committees in order to ensure the operational efficiency and specific issues are being handled by relevant expertise. Three board committees have been established and each of them has its specific duties and authorities setting out in its own terms of reference. Written terms of reference, which are in line with the CG Code, of each of the Audit Committee, the Remuneration Committee and the Nomination Committee are available on the website of the Company and the designated website of the Stock Exchange.

### Audit Committee

During the year, the Audit Committee comprises Mr. Leung Hok Lim (Chairman), Mr. Chan Wah Tip, Michael, Professor Yeung Kwok Wing, Mr. Woo King Wai and Mr. Wong Shiu Hoi, Peter.

## BOARD COMMITTEES (Cont'd)

### Audit Committee (Cont'd)

The Company has complied with the requirement of the Listing Rules in establishing an audit committee comprising at least three members who must be Non-executive Directors only, and the majority thereof must be Independent Non-executive Directors, at least one of whom must have appropriate professional qualifications, or accounting or related financial management expertise. The Audit Committee adopted the terms of reference with reference to "A Guide for the Formation of an Audit Committee" issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and in accordance with the requirements of the CG Code.

The main duties of the Audit Committee are set out below:

- (i) to recommend to the Board on the appointment, reappointment and removal of the external auditor, and any questions of resignation or dismissal of the auditor;
- (ii) to review and monitor the external auditors' independence and objectivity and the effectiveness of the audit process in accordance with applicable standard;
- (iii) to develop and implement policy on the engagement of external auditor to supply non-audit services;
- (iv) to monitor integrity of financial statements of the Company and the Company's annual and interim reports and accounts, and to review significant financial reporting judgments contained in such reports;
- (v) to review the Company's financial controls, internal control and risk management systems; and
- (vi) to review the Group's financial and accounting policies and practices.

No member of the Audit Committee is a former partner of the existing auditing firm of the Company during the one year after he/she ceases to be a partner of the auditing firm.

During the year, the Audit Committee held three regular meetings to review and provide supervision of the Group's financial reporting system and internal control procedures, review of the Group's financial information and review of the relationship with the Auditor of the Company. The members' attendance to the Committee meeting is listed out on page 26.

The Board adopted the Whistle-Blowing Policy in August 2013 setting out the approach for employees and those who deal with the issuer (e.g. Customers and suppliers) to raise concerns, in confidence, with audit committee about possible improprieties in any matter related to the issuer. The Company shall present the quarterly whistle-blowing report to the Audit Committee for review.

In March 2014, the Audit Committee has reviewed the audited consolidated financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2013. Minutes drafted by the secretary of Audit Committee are circulated to members of the Audit Committee within a reasonable time after each meeting.

### **Remuneration Committee**

During the year, the Remuneration Committee comprises Mr. Wong Shiu Hoi, Peter (Chairman), Mr. Chan Wah Tip, Michael, Professor Yeung Kwok Wing, Mr. Woo King Wai and Mr. Leung Hok Lim.

The Remuneration Committee is mainly responsible for making recommendations to the Board on the Company's policy and structure for remuneration of directors and senior management and reviewing the specific remuneration packages of all Executive Directors and senior management by reference to corporate goals and objectives resolved by the Board from time to time. The Remuneration Committee make recommendation to the Board on the remuneration packages of, including benefits in kind, pension rights and compensation payments, of individual executive directors and senior management.

The Remuneration Committee consulted the Chairman about their proposals relating to remuneration package and other human resources issues of the directors and senior management of the Company. The emoluments of directors and senior management are based on the skill, knowledge and involvement in the Company's affairs of each director and senior management and are determined by reference to the Company's performance and profitability, as well as remuneration benchmark in the industry and the prevailing market conditions.

During the year, the Remuneration Committee reviewed the remuneration packages of Executive Directors and made recommendation to the Board for the policy and structure for remuneration of directors and senior management. A regular meeting of Remuneration Committee has been convened in March 2013 and members' attendance to the Remuneration Committee meeting is listed out on page 26.

Particulars of directors' emoluments and employee's emoluments for the year ended 31 December 2013 are set out in note 9 to the consolidated financial statements.

### **Nomination Committee**

The Nomination Committee is mainly responsible for reviewing the structure, size and composition (including the skills, knowledge and experience) of the Board and making recommendations to the Board on the appointment or re-appointment of directors. Formal nomination procedures were adopted by the Board for governing the nomination and re-election of directors.

During the year, the Nomination Committee reviewed the structure of the Board, the independence of independent non-executive directors and made recommendations in relation to the re-appointment of the retiring directors. It also made recommendation to the Board for adoption of the Board Diversity Policy. A regular meeting of Nomination Committee has been convened in March 2013 and members' attendance to the Nomination Committee meeting is listed out on page 26.

### Auditors' Remuneration

## INTERNAL CONTROL

The Board has overall responsibilities for maintaining sound and effective internal control system of the Group. The Board conducts reviews of the effectiveness of the internal control system for the year ended 31 December 2013 covering all material controls, including financial, operational and compliance controls and risk management functions by considering reviews performed by the Audit Committee, executive management and both the group internal audit department and external auditor. The Group's system of internal control comprises a defined management structure with limits of authority, is designed to help the achievement of business objectives, safeguard assets against unauthorised use or disposition, ensure the maintenance of proper accounting records for the provision of reliable financial information for internal use or for publication, and ensure compliance with relevant legislation and regulations.

The system is designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss and to manage rather than eliminate risks of failure in operational systems and achievement of the Group's objectives.

The criteria for the Board to assess the effectiveness of the system of internal control are listed below:

**(i) Organisational Structure**

An organisational structure with operating policies and procedures, lines of responsibility and delegated authority has been already established.

**(ii) Authority and Control**

The relevant Executive Directors and senior management are delegated with respective levels of authorities with regard to key corporate strategy and policy and contractual commitments. The Board is responsible for handling and dissemination of price sensitive information through discussion and delegation of authority to the Company Secretary.

## INTERNAL CONTROL (Cont'd)

### (iii) Budgetary Control and Financial Reporting

Budgets are prepared annually by the senior management and are subject to review and approval of the Executive Directors prior to being adopted. There are procedures for the appraisal, review and approval of major capital and recurrent expenditure. Results of operations against budgets are reported regularly to the Executive Directors. Proper controls are in place for the recording of complete, accurate and timely accounting and management information. Regular reviews and audits are carried out to ensure that the preparation of consolidated financial statements is carried out in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, the Group's accounting policies and applicable laws and regulations.

### (iv) Systems and Procedures

Systems and procedures are set to identify, measure, manage and control risks including business, compliance, operational, financial and information services risks that may have an impact on the Group and each principal division. Exposure to these risks is monitored by the Executive Directors and the management of the respective principal divisions.

### (v) Internal Audit

The group internal audit department performs independent reviews of the controls and risks identified to provide reasonable assurance to management of the Company and principal divisions and the Audit Committee that controls have been set in place and adequately addressed.

The group internal audit department monitors compliance with policies and procedures as well as the effectiveness of internal control structures across the Company and the Group. To preserve the independence of the group internal audit department, the group internal audit department reports directly to the Audit Committee. The group internal audit department plans its internal audit schedules annually in consultation with, but independent of, management of the Group and the principal divisions. In addition to its agreed annual schedule of work, the group internal audit department conducts other special reviews as required. As a key criterion of assessing the effectiveness of the internal control system, the Board and the Audit Committee actively monitor the number and seriousness of findings raised by the group internal audit department and also the corrective actions taken by relevant departments.

According to the 2013 internal audit reports, the Group's internal control system is functioning effectively and there was no significant weakness found in the course of the audits carried out during the year. The Board, through the Audit Committee and the internal audit function, has reviewed the effectiveness of the Group's internal control system and is of the view that there are no suspected frauds, irregularities, internal control deficiencies or suspected infringement of laws, rules and regulations that cause the Board to believe that the systems are ineffective or inadequate. The Board is satisfied that the Company and the Group have fully complied with the code provisions on internal control as set forth in the CG Code for the year ended 31 December 2013.

## COMPANY SECRETARY

The Company Secretary is a full-time employee of the Company and has day-to-day knowledge of the Company's affairs. All Directors have access to the advice and services of the Company Secretary with a view to ensuring that Board procedures, and all applicable rules and regulations, are followed. For the year ended 31 December 2013, the Company Secretary has complied with Rule 3.29 of the Listing Rules by taking no less than 15 hours of relevant professional training.

## COMMUNICATION WITH SHAREHOLDERS

The Board recognises the importance of communication with our shareholders. In March 2012, the Company adopted a shareholders communication policy to set out the Company's processes to provide shareholders and investment public with equal and timely information on the Company for them to make informed assessments of the Company's strategy, operations and financial performance.

### General Meeting

At 2013 AGM held:

- (i) A separate resolution was proposed by the Chairman of that meeting in respect of each separate issue, including the re-election of directors.
- (ii) The Chairman of the Board, and Chairmen of the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee and Nomination Committee, or in absence of the chairman of such committees, any member from the respective committees, attended the 2013 AGM to address shareholders queries.
- (iii) External auditor attended the 2013 AGM and was available to assist the directors in addressing queries from shareholders relating to the conduct of the audit and the preparation and content of its auditor's report.
- (iv) The Chairman demanded poll on all resolutions. Tricor Secretaries Limited, the Company's Hong Kong branch share registrar and transfer office, was engaged as scrutineer to ensure the votes were properly counted.

The 2014 AGM will be held at 10th Floor, High Fashion Centre, 1-11 Kwai Hei Street, Kwai Chung, New Territories, Hong Kong on Friday, 6 June 2014 at 10:30 a.m. Notice of the 2014 AGM will be sent to all shareholders at least 20 clear business days before the said meeting.

### Voting by Poll

It was properly explained at the commencement of the 2013 AGM the procedures for conducting a poll.

At the 2014 AGM, the Chairman of the meeting will demand a poll on all the resolutions in accordance with the requirements of the Listing Rules. The poll results will be posted on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company on the same day following the meeting.

## COMMUNICATION WITH SHAREHOLDERS (Cont'd)

### Shareholders' Rights

#### *Procedures for shareholders convening meetings*

The Company holds a general meeting as its annual general meeting every year. Each general meeting, other than annual general meeting, shall be called a special general meeting ("SGM").

Pursuant to the Company's Bye-Laws, the shareholders of the Company holding at the date of the deposit of the requisition not less than one-tenth of the paid-up capital of the Company carrying the right of voting at general meetings of the Company shall at all times have the right, by written requisition to the Board, to require a SGM to be called by the Board for the transaction of any business specified in such requisition. The written requisition must be deposited at 11th Floor, High Fashion Centre, 1-11 Kwai Hei Street, Kwai Chung, New Territories, Hong Kong, the Company's Head Office and Principal Place of Business in Hong Kong, for the attention of the Company Secretary.

#### *Procedures for shareholders putting forward proposals*

Pursuant to the Company's Bye-Laws, any shareholder, who wishes to propose a person other than a retiring Director of the Company for election as a Director at a general meeting of the Company. The Company's procedures for shareholders to propose a person for election as a director are available on the Company's website.

### Investor Relations

The Company establishes different communication channels with shareholders and investors: (i) shareholders can receive printed copies of corporate information, (ii) the general meeting provides a forum for shareholders to raise comments and exchange views with the Board, (iii) the Company's website offers communication channel between the Company and its shareholders and investors; and (iv) the Company's Hong Kong branch share registrar and transfer office serve the shareholders respecting all share registration matters.

Information in relation to the Group is disseminated to shareholders in a timely manner through a number of formal channels, which include interim and annual reports, announcements, and circulars. Such published documents, together with the latest corporate information are also made available on the Company's website. The corporate information and shareholders & investor relation information is set out on pages 129 to 130 of this annual report.

# Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 December 2013

## 1. GENERAL

The Company is incorporated in Bermuda as an exempted company with limited liability and its shares are listed on the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the “Stock Exchange”). The address of the registered office and principal place of business of the Company are disclosed on page 129 to the annual report.

As at 31 December 2013, Hinton Company Limited and High Fashion Charitable Foundation Limited, companies ultimately owned by Mr. Lam Foo Wah (“Mr. Lam”), the Chairman and Managing Director of the Company, and Mr. Lam collectively owns 50.72% of ordinary shares of the Company and holds the same percentage of voting rights in the Company. Accordingly, Mr. Lam is considered as the ultimate controlling party of the Company.

The functional currency of the Company is Renminbi (“RMB”), the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company and its major subsidiaries operates. For the purpose of the preparation of the consolidated financial statements and conveniences of the financial statements users, the results and financial position of the Group are presented in Hong Kong dollars (“HK\$”).

The Company acts as investment holding company. The principal activities of the Group are the manufacture, retailing and trading of garments.

The amendments to HKFRS 7 require entities to disclose information about rights of offset and related arrangements for financial instruments under an enforceable master netting agreement or similar agreement. The Group has not offset any recognised financial instruments but the Group has derivative financial instruments that are under enforceable master netting agreements.

The amendments have been applied retrospectively and the relevant disclosures are set out in note 39.

#### *New and revised Standards on consolidation, joint arrangements, associates and disclosures*

In the current year, the Group has applied for the first time the package of five standards on consolidation, joint arrangements, associates and disclosures comprising HKFRS 10 “Consolidated financial statements”, HKFRS 11 “Joint arrangements”, HKFRS 12 “Disclosure of interests in other entities”, HKAS 27 (as revised in 2011) “Separate financial statements” and HKAS 28 (as revised in 2011) “Investments in associates and joint ventures”, together with the amendments to HKFRS 10, HKFRS 11 and HKFRS 12 regarding transitional guidance.

HKAS 27 (as revised in 2011) is not applicable to the Group as it deals only with separate financial statements.

#### *New and revised Standards on consolidation, joint arrangements, associates and disclosures (Cont’d)*

##### *Impact of the application of HKFRS 10*

HKFRS 10 replaces the parts of HKAS 27 “Consolidated and separate financial statements” that deal with consolidated financial statements and HK(SIC) – INT 12 “Consolidation – special purpose entities”. HKFRS 10 changes the definition of control such that an investor has control over an investee when a) it has power over the investee, b) it is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and c) has the ability to use its power to affect its returns. All three of these criteria must be met for an investor to have control over an investee. Previously, control was defined as the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. Additional guidance has been included in HKFRS 10 to explain when an investor has control over an investee.

The directors of the Company reviewed and assessed the Group’s investees in accordance with the requirements of HKFRS 10. The directors of the Company concluded that there was no impact to the Group’s consolidated financial statements for the adoption of HKFRS 10.

##### *Impact of the application of HKFRS 11*

HKFRS 11 replaces HKAS 31 “Interests in joint ventures”, and the guidance contained in a related interpretation, HK(SIC) – INT 13 “Jointly controlled entities – non-monetary contributions by venturers”, has been incorporated in HKAS 28 (as revised in 2011). HKFRS 11 deals with how a joint arrangement of which two or more parties have joint control should be classified and accounted for. Under HKFRS 11, there are only two types of joint arrangements – joint operations and joint ventures. The classification of joint arrangements under HKFRS 11 is determined based on the rights and obligations of parties to the joint arrangements by considering the structure, the legal form of the arrangements, the contractual terms agreed by the parties to the arrangement, and, when relevant, other facts and circumstances. A joint operation is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement (i.e. joint operators) have rights to the assets, and obligations for the liabilities, relating to the arrangement. A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement (i.e. joint venturers) have rights to the net assets of the arrangement. Previously, HKAS 31 had three types of joint arrangements – jointly controlled entities, jointly controlled operations and jointly controlled assets. The classification of joint arrangements under HKAS 31 was primarily determined based on the legal form of the arrangement (e.g. a joint arrangement that was established through a separate entity was classified as a jointly controlled entity).

Investments in joint ventures are accounted for using the equity method.

##### *Impact of the application of HKFRS 11 (Cont’d)*

The directors of the Company reviewed and assessed the classification of the Group’s investments in joint arrangements in accordance with the requirements of HKFRS 11. The directors of the Company concluded that the Group’s investments in Hangzhou Dalifu Silk Finishing Co., Ltd., Suzhou High Fashion Garment Co., Ltd., The Silk Passion Company Limited and Flaming China Limited, which were classified as jointly controlled entities under HKAS 31 and were accounted for using the equity method, should be classified as joint ventures under HKFRS 11 and continuously accounted for using the equity method. There was no impact to the Group’s consolidated financial statements for the adoption of HKFRS 11.

##### *Impact of the application of HKFRS 12*

HKFRS 12 is a disclosure standard and is applicable to entities that have interests in subsidiaries, joint arrangements, associates and/or unconsolidated structured entities. In general, the application of HKFRS 12 has resulted in more extensive disclosures in the consolidated financial statements (please see notes 18, 30 and 48 for details).

##### **HKFRS 13 Fair value measurement**

The Group has applied HKFRS 13 for the first time in the current year. HKFRS 13 establishes a single source of guidance for, and disclosures about, fair value measurements. The scope of HKFRS 13 is broad: the fair value measurement requirements of HKFRS 13 apply to both financial instrument items and non-financial instrument items for which other HKFRSs require or permit fair value measurements and disclosures about fair value measurements, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of HKFRS 2 Share-based Payment, leasing transactions that are within the scope of HKAS 17 Leases, and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value (e.g. net realisable value for the purposes of measuring inventories or value in use for impairment assessment purposes).

HKFRS 13 defines fair value of an asset as the price that would be received to sell an asset (or paid to transfer a liability, in the case of determining the fair value of a liability) in an orderly transaction in the principal (or most advantageous) market at the measurement date under current market conditions. A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant’s ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. Fair value under HKFRS 13 is an exit price regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. Also, HKFRS 13 includes extensive disclosure requirements.

#### *HKFRS 13 Fair value measurement (Cont’d)*

HKFRS 13 requires prospective application. In accordance with the transitional provisions of HKFRS 13, the Group has not made any new disclosures required by HKFRS 13 for the 2012 comparative period (please see notes 17 and 38 for the 2013 disclosures). Other than the additional disclosures, the application of HKFRS 13 has not had any material impact on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements.

#### *Amendments to HKAS 1 Presentation of items of other comprehensive income*

The Group has applied the amendments to HKAS 1 “Presentation of items of other comprehensive income”. Upon the adoption of the amendments to HKAS 1, the Group’s ‘statement of comprehensive income’ is renamed as the ‘statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income’. Furthermore, the amendments to HKAS 1 require additional disclosures to be made in the other comprehensive income section such that items of other comprehensive income are grouped into two categories: (a) items that will not be reclassified subsequently to profit or loss and (b) items that may be reclassified subsequently to profit or loss when specific conditions are met. Income tax on items of other comprehensive income is required to be allocated on the same basis – the amendments do not change the option to present items of other comprehensive income either before tax or net of tax. The amendments have been applied retrospectively, and hence the presentation of items of other comprehensive income has been modified to reflect the changes. Other than the above mentioned presentation changes, the application of the amendments to HKAS 1 does not result in any impact on profit or loss, other comprehensive income and total comprehensive income.

#### *HKFRS 9 Financial instruments (Cont’d)*

Key requirements of HKFRS 9 are described as follows:

- all recognised financial assets that are within the scope of HKAS 39 “Financial instruments: Recognition and measurement” are subsequently measured at amortised cost or fair value. Specifically, debt investments that are held within a business model whose objective is to collect the contractual cash flows, and that have contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding are generally measured at amortised cost at the end of subsequent accounting periods. All other debt investments and equity investments are measured at their fair values at the end of subsequent accounting periods. In addition, under HKFRS 9, entities may make an irrevocable election to present subsequent changes in the fair value of an equity investment (that is not held for trading) in other comprehensive income, with only dividend income generally recognised in profit or loss.
- With regard to the measurement of financial liabilities designated as at fair value through profit or loss, HKFRS 9 requires that the amount of change in the fair value of the financial liability that is attributable to changes in the credit risk of that liability is presented in other comprehensive income, unless the recognition of the effects of changes in the liability’s credit risk in other comprehensive income would create or enlarge an accounting mismatch in profit or loss. Changes in fair value of financial liabilities attributable to changes in the financial liabilities’ credit risk are not subsequently reclassified to profit or loss. Under HKAS 39, the entire amount of the change in the fair value of the financial liability designated as fair value through profit or loss was presented in profit or loss.
- The new general hedge accounting requirements retain the three types of hedge accounting. However, greater flexibility has been introduced to the types of transactions eligible for hedge accounting, specifically broadening the types of instruments that qualify for hedging instruments and the types of risk components of non-financial items that are eligible for hedge accounting. In addition, the effectiveness test has been overhauled and replaced with the principle of an ‘economic relationship’. Retrospective assessment of hedge effectiveness is also no longer required. Enhanced disclosure requirements about an entity’s risk management activities have also been introduced.

The directors anticipate that the application of HKFRS 9 in the future may have an impact on the amounts reported in respect of the Groups’ available-for sale investments. Specifically, HKFRS 9 requires available-for-sale equity investments be measured at fair values with changes in fair value being accounted for either in the profit or loss or other comprehensive income. In addition, the application of amendments to HKFRS 9 may also have an impact on the Group’s financial instruments under hedge accounting. However, it is not practicable to provide a reasonable estimate of that effect until a detailed review has been completed.

#### *Amendments to HKAS 32 Offsetting financial assets and financial liabilities*

The amendments to HKAS 32 clarify existing application issues relating to the offset of financial assets and financial liabilities requirements. Specifically, the amendments clarify the meaning of ‘currently has a legally enforceable right of set-off’ and ‘simultaneous realisation and settlement’.

The directors of the Company anticipate that the application of these amendments to HKAS 32 will not have a significant impact on the Group’s consolidated financial statements as the Group does not have any financial assets and financial liabilities that qualify for offset.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for investment properties and certain financial instruments that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant’s ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. Fair value under HKFRS 13 is an exit price regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these consolidated financial statements is determined on such a basis, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of HKFRS 2, leasing transactions that are within the scope of HKAS 17, and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in HKAS 2 or value in use in HKAS 36.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs are inputs, other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The principal accounting policies are set out below.

### Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Company:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date when the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Profit or loss and each item of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests. Total comprehensive income of subsidiaries is attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

When necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies in line with the Group's accounting policies.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

### Basis of consolidation (Cont'd)

All intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

### Investments in joint ventures

A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint arrangement. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The results and assets and liabilities of joint ventures are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting. The financial statements of joint ventures used for equity accounting purposes are prepared using uniform accounting policies as those of the Group for like transactions and events in similar circumstances. Under the equity method, an investment in a joint venture is initially recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the joint venture. When the Group's share of losses of a joint venture exceeds the Group's interest in that joint venture (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in joint venture), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the joint venture.

An investment in a joint venture is accounted for using the equity method from the date on which the investee becomes a joint venture. On acquisition of the investment in a joint venture, any excess of the cost of the investment over the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities of the investee is recognised as goodwill, which is included within the carrying amount of the investment. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of the investment, after reassessment, is recognised immediately in profit or loss in the period in which the investment is acquired.

The requirements of HKAS 39 are applied to determine whether it is necessary to recognise any impairment loss with respect to the Group's investment in a joint venture. When necessary, the entire carrying amount of the investment is tested for impairment in accordance with HKAS 36 "Impairment of assets" as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs to sell) with its carrying amount. Any impairment loss recognised forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with HKAS 36 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

### Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods sold in the normal course of business, net of discounts and sales related taxes.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the goods are delivered and title has passed, at which time all the following conditions are satisfied:

- the Group has transferred to the buyer the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods;
- the Group retains neither continuing managerial involvement to the degree usually associated with ownership nor effective control over the goods sold;
- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Group; and
- the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably.

Interest income from a financial asset is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Group and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

The Group's accounting policy for recognition of revenue from operating leases is described in the accounting policy for leasing below.

### Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment including leasehold land and buildings held for use in the production or supply of goods, or for administrative purposes, other than construction in progress, are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Properties in the course of construction for production, supply or administrative purposes are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Costs include professional fees and, for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalised in accordance with the Group's accounting policy. Such properties are classified to the appropriate categories of property, plant and equipment when completed and ready for intended use. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

### Property, plant and equipment (Cont'd)

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of assets, other than construction in progress, less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

Assets held under finance leases are depreciated over their expected useful lives on the same basis as owned assets. However, when there is no reasonable certainty that ownership will be obtained by the end of the lease term, assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

### Investment properties

Investment properties are properties held to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation (including properties under construction for such purposes). Investment properties include land held for undetermined future use, which is regarded as held for capital appreciation purpose.

Investment properties are initially measured at cost, including any directly attributable expenditure. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are measured at their fair values. Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of investment property are included in profit or loss for the period in which they arise.

Construction costs incurred for investment properties under construction are capitalised as part of the carrying amount of the investment properties under construction.

An investment property is derecognised upon disposal or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefits are expected from its disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the property (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the profit or loss in the period in which the property is derecognised.

### Leasing

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

#### *The Group as lessor*

Rental income from operating leases is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

#### *The Group as lessee*

Assets held under finance leases are recognised as assets of the Group at their fair value at the inception of the lease or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the consolidated statement of financial position as a finance lease obligation.

Lease payments are apportioned between finance expenses and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance expenses are recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless they are directly attributable to qualifying assets, in which case they are capitalised in accordance with the Group's general policy on borrowing costs (see the accounting policy below). Contingent rentals are recognised as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term, except where another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed. Contingent rentals arising under operating leases are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are recognised as a liability. The aggregate benefit of incentives is recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight-line basis, except where another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed.

#### *Leasehold land and building*

When a lease includes both land and building elements, the Group assesses the classification of each element as a finance or an operating lease separately based on the assessment as to whether substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of each element have been transferred to the Group, unless it is clear that both elements are operating lease in which case the entire lease is classified as an operating lease. Specifically, the minimum lease payments (including any lump-sum upfront payments) are allocated between the land and the building elements in proportion to the relative fair values of the leasehold interests in the land element and building element of the lease at the inception of the lease.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

### Leasing (Cont'd)

#### *Leasehold land and building (Cont'd)*

To the extent the allocation of the lease payments can be made reliably, interest in leasehold land that is accounted for as an operating lease is presented as “prepaid lease payments” in the consolidated statement of financial position and is amortised over the lease term on a straight-line basis except for those that are classified and accounted for as investment properties under the fair value model. When the lease payments cannot be allocated reliably between the land and building elements, the entire lease is generally classified as a finance lease and accounted for as property, plant and equipment.

### Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rates of exchanges prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences on monetary items are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

For the purposes of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. Hong Kong dollars) using exchange rate prevailing at the end of each reporting period. Income and expenses items are translated at the average exchange rates for the year. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of “translation reserve”.

### Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

### Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from “profit before taxation” as reported in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income because of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group’s liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax base used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary difference to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries and interests in joint arrangements, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of the reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

### Taxation (Cont'd)

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for investment properties that are measured using the fair value model, the carrying amounts of such properties are presumed to be recovered entirely through sale, unless the presumption is rebutted. The presumption is rebutted when the investment property is depreciable and is held within a business model whose objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the investment property over time, rather than through sale.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when it relates to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

### Government grants

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Group recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate. Specifically, government grants whose primary condition is that the Group should purchase, construct or otherwise acquire non-current assets are recognised as a deduction from the carrying amount of the relevant asset in the consolidated statement of financial position and transferred to profit or loss on a systematic and rational basis over the useful lives of the related assets.

Government grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable.

### Research and development expenditure

Expenditure on research activities is recognised as an expense in the period in which it is incurred.

An internally-generated intangible asset arising from development activities (or from the development phase of an internal project) is recognised if, and only if, all of the following have been demonstrated:

- the technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale;
- the intention to complete the intangible asset and use or sell it;
- the ability to use or sell the intangible asset;
- how the intangible asset will generate probable future economic benefits;
- the availability of adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use or sell the intangible asset; and
- the ability to measure reliably the expenditure attributable to the intangible asset during its development.

The amount initially recognised for internally-generated intangible asset is the sum of the expenditure incurred from the date when the intangible asset first meets the recognition criteria listed above. Where no internally-generated intangible asset can be recognised, development expenditure is charged to profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred. Subsequent to initial recognition, internally-generated intangible asset is measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses (if any), on the same basis the intangible asset that is acquired separately.

### Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventories are determined on a first-in, first-out method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for inventories less all estimated cost of completion and costs necessary to make the sale.

### Retirement benefit costs

Payments to Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme and state-managed retirement benefit schemes are recognised as an expense when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

## 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

### **Financial instruments**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

### ***Financial assets***

The Group's financial assets include loans and receivables, financial assets at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL") and available-for-sale financial assets. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

### ***Effective interest method***

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts (including all fees paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset, or, where appropriate, a shorter period to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Interest income is recognised on an effective interest basis for loans and receivables.

### ***Financial assets at FVTPL***

Financial assets are classified as financial assets at FVTPL when it is a derivative that is not designated and effective as hedging instruments; or it forms part of a contract containing one or more embedded derivatives, and HKAS 39 permits the entire combined contract to be designated as at FVTPL upon initial recognition.

Financial assets at FVTPL are stated at fair value, with any gains or losses arising on remeasurement recognised in profit or loss. The net gain or loss recognised in the profit or loss excludes any interest earned on the financial assets and is included in other income line item. Fair value is determined in the manner described in note 38.

#### *Financial assets (Cont'd)*

##### *Loans and receivables*

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Subsequent to initial recognition, loans and receivables (including trade and bills receivables, deposits and other receivables, amounts due from joint ventures, short-term deposits and bank balances and cash) are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment (see accounting policy on impairment of financial assets below).

##### *Available-for-sale financial assets*

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated as available-for-sale or not classified as loans and receivables or financial assets at FVTPL. The Group designated certain items of financial assets that are acquired for long term investments as available-for-sale financial assets.

Available-for-sale equity investments that do not have a quoted market price in an active market and whose fair value cannot be reliably measured and derivatives that are linked to and must be settled by delivery of such unquoted equity instruments are measured at cost less any identified impairment losses at the end of each reporting period (see accounting policy on impairment of financial assets below).

##### *Impairment of financial assets*

Financial assets, other than those at FVTPL, are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of the reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the financial assets have been affected.

For an available-for-sale equity investment, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of that investment below its cost is considered to be objective evidence of impairment.

For all other financial assets, objective evidence of impairment could include:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty; or
- breach of contract, such as default or delinquency in interest and principal payments; or
- it becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial re-organisation.

##### *Impairment of financial assets (Cont'd)*

For certain categories of financial asset, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed not to be impaired individually are, in addition, assessed for impairment on a collective basis. Objective evidence of impairment for a portfolio of receivables could include the Group's past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments, observable changes in national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognised is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset. Such impairment loss will not be reversed in subsequent periods.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognised in profit or loss. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited to profit or loss.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment losses was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the asset at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

#### *Financial liabilities and equity instruments*

Debt and equity instruments issued by a group entity are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity instruments in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Group after deducting all of its liabilities.

##### *Financial liabilities at FVTPL*

Financial liabilities are classified as financial liabilities at FVTPL when it is a derivative that is not designated and effective as hedging instruments.

Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value, with any gains or losses arising on remeasurement recognised in profit or loss. The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss excludes any interest paid on the financial liabilities.

##### *Other financial liabilities*

Other financial liabilities including trade and bills payables, other payables, amount due to an associate, bank overdrafts and bank borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

##### *Effective interest method*

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Interest expense is recognised on an effective interest basis.

##### *Equity instruments*

Equity instruments issued by the Company are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Repurchase of the Company's own equity instruments is recognised and deducted directly in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss on the purchase, sale, issue or cancellation of the Company's own equity instruments.

##### *Derivative financial instruments and hedging*

Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value at the date when a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured to their fair value at the end of the reporting period. The resulting gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately unless the derivative is designated and effective as a hedging instrument, in which event the timing of the recognition in profit or loss depends on the nature of the hedge relationship.

#### *Derivative financial instruments and hedging (Cont'd)*

##### *Hedge accounting*

The Group designates certain derivatives as hedges of cash flow hedges, which are hedges of highly probable forecast transactions with group companies and external customers for foreign currency risk exposure and hedges of interest rate risk associated with the Group's floating rate bank borrowings. For hedges of foreign currency exposure, the hedged item represents highly probable forecast transactions which are denominated in a currency other than the functional currency of respective group entity entering into the transactions and the foreign currency risk under the hedging arrangement will affect the profit or loss. For hedges of interest rate risk, the hedged item is the Group's floating rate bank borrowing and the risk being hedged represents the volatility in interest payments resulted from changes in interest rates.

At the inception of the hedging relationship, the Group documents the relationship between the hedging instrument and hedged item, along with its risk management objectives and its strategy for undertaking various hedge transactions. Furthermore, at the inception of the hedge and on an ongoing basis, the Group documents whether the hedging instrument that is used in a hedging relationship is highly effective in offsetting changes in cash flows of the hedged item.

##### *Cash flow hedges*

The effective portion of changes in the fair value of derivatives that are designated and qualify as cash flow hedges are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in hedging reserve. The gain or loss relating to the ineffective portion is recognised immediately in profit or loss as other gains or losses.

Amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity (hedging reserve) are reclassified to profit or loss in the periods when the hedged item is recognised in profit or loss, in the same line of the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income as the recognised hedged item.

Hedge accounting is discontinued when the Group revokes the hedging relationship, the hedging instrument expires or is sold, terminated, or exercised, or when it no longer qualifies for hedge accounting. Any gain or loss recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity at that time remains in equity and is recognised when the hedged risk is ultimately recognised in profit or loss. When a forecast transaction is no longer expected to occur, the gain or loss accumulated in equity is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### *Derecognition*

The Group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. If the Group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Group continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

The Group derecognises financial liability when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

#### **Impairment losses on tangible assets**

At the end of the reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets with finite useful lives to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Where a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash-generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash-generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or a cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

## 4. CRITICAL JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Group's accounting policies, which are described in note 3, the directors of the Company are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

### Allowance for inventories

Management of the Group reviews an aging analysis at the end of the reporting period, and makes allowance for obsolete and slow-moving inventory items identified that are not suitable for use in current production. Management estimates the net realisable value for such raw materials, work in progress and finished goods based primarily on the latest invoice prices and current market conditions. However, given the competitiveness of the industry, these prices may subsequently be affected. The Group carries out an inventory review on a product-by-product basis at the end of the reporting period and makes allowance for these items. At end of the reporting period, the carrying amount of inventories is HK\$537,422,000 (2012: HK\$427,302,000).

### Income taxes

The Hong Kong Inland Revenue Department ("IRD") initiated a tax audit on certain group companies for the years of assessment 1999/2000 onwards. Since the tax audit is still at a fact-finding stage with different views being exchanged with the IRD, the outcome of the tax audit cannot be readily ascertained with any degree of accuracy. In the opinion of directors, the provisions so made are adequate. In cases where the tax charged by IRD are different from the estimated amounts, a material tax charge may arise (see note 10 for details).

### Allowance for trade receivables

Management of the Group reviews an aging analysis, repayment history of its trade receivables and takes into consideration the estimation of future cash flows to determine allowance for trade receivables. Where the actual future cash flows are less than expected, impairment loss may arise. As at 31 December 2013, the carrying amount of trade receivables is HK\$426,178,000 (net of allowance for doubtful debts of HK\$29,711,000) (2012: carrying amount of HK\$416,892,000, net of allowance for doubtful debts of HK\$27,787,000).

### Fair value of investment properties

The Group appointed independent qualified professional valuers to determine the fair values of investment properties of the Group. Upon application of HKFRS 13, the valuers have applied the highest and best use basis from the perspective of market participants. The valuation involves, inter-alia, certain estimates, including comparable market transactions, appropriate capitalisation rates and reversionary income potential and redevelopment potential. In relying on the valuation, management has exercised its judgment and is satisfied that the method of valuation is reflective of the current market conditions. As at 31 December 2013, the carrying amount of investment properties is HK\$959,403,000 (2012: HK\$665,576,000).

## 5. REVENUE

Revenue represents the amount received and receivable for goods sold by the Group, net of discount and sales related tax. An analysis of the Group's revenue is as follows:

## 6. SEGMENT INFORMATION

Information reported to the chief operating decision maker, the Group's executive directors, for the purposes of resource allocation and performance assessment, is analysed based on the types of goods sold, including (i) manufacture and trading of garments and (ii) brand business, representing sales of branded garments developed by the Group.

As a matter of IRD's practice, the IRD has issued estimated/additional assessments ("Assessments") demanding for tax to the relevant group companies for the years of assessment 1999/2000 to 2006/2007. During the course of the tax audit, there may be a possibility that estimated additional assessments for subsequent years be issued by the IRD to these group companies.

They are subject to an income tax rate of 15% for three years starting from the year being recognised as advanced technology enterprises.

All of the Group's completed investment properties are held under operating leases to earn rentals or for capital appreciation purposes and measured using the fair value model and are classified and accounted for as investment properties.

At 31 December 2013, included in investment properties under/held for development of HK\$109,559,000 (2012: nil) are located in the PRC and the Group is in the process of obtaining the land use right certificate.

The fair value of the Group's investment properties at 31 December 2013 and 2012 have been arrived at on the basis of a valuation carried out by Centaline Surveyors Limited, 新昌信安達資產評估有限公司 and 杭州蕭審資產評估有限公司, which are independent qualified professional valuers not connected with the Group. Centaline Surveyors Limited are members of the Institute of Valuers and 新昌信安達資產評估有限公司 and 杭州蕭審資產評估有限公司 are certified public valuers in the PRC.

For the completed investment properties, the valuations were arrived at by reference to market evidence of transaction prices for similar properties in similar locations and conditions and on the basis of capitalisation of net income with due allowance for the reversionary income and redevelopment potential. The net income is the market rentals of all lettable units of the properties and discounted at the market yield expected by investors for this type of properties. The market rentals are assessed by reference to the rentals achieved in the lettable units of the properties as well as other lettings of similar properties in the neighbourhood. The discount rate is determined by reference to the yields derived from analysing the sales transactions of similar properties in the relevant locations and adjusted to take into account the market expectation from property investors to reflect factors specific to the Group's investment properties.

For the investment properties under/held for development, for which the management has yet to complete and obtain approval for the building development plan, valuation is arrived at by making reference to comparable market sale and purchase transactions of vacant land.

There has been no change from the valuation technique used. In estimating the fair value of the completed properties, the highest and best use of the properties is their current use.

In estimating the fair value of investment properties under/held for development, management has taken into account the highest and best use of the properties from the perspective of market participants, taking into account the future development potential of the investment properties.

The Group's investment properties are categorised into level 3 of the fair value hierarchy. At the end of each reporting period, the chief financial officer ("CFO") works closely with the independent qualified professional valuers to establish and determine the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs to be used in determining the fair value of the investment properties. Discussion of valuation processes and results are held between CFO and the directors of the Company at least twice a year.

## 19. DEPOSIT PLACED AND PREPAYMENT OF PREMIUM FOR A LIFE INSURANCE

During the year ended 31 December 2010, the Group entered into a life insurance policy with an insurance company to insure an executive director. Under the policy, the beneficiary and policy holder is High Fashion Garments Management Limited (“HFGML”), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Company, and the total insured sum is approximately US\$10,000,000 (equivalent to HK\$77,500,000). HFGML paid a gross premium of US\$3,582,000 (equivalent to HK\$27,763,000), including a premium charge at inception of the policy amounting to US\$214,941 (equivalent to HK\$1,666,000). HFGML may request a partial surrender or full surrender of the policy at any time and receive cash back based on the cash value of the policy at the date of withdrawal, which is determined by the gross premium paid plus accumulated guaranteed interest earned and minus insurance premium charged at inception. In addition, if withdrawal is made between the 1st to 15th policy year, there is a specified surrender charge. At the inception date, the gross premium was separated into deposit placed and prepayment of life insurance premium. The prepayment of life insurance premium is amortised to profit or loss over the insured period and the deposit placed is carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The insurance company will pay HFGML a guaranteed interest rate of 5.2% per annum for the first year, followed by minimum guaranteed interest rate of 3% per annum for the following years.

The effective interest rate for the deposit placed on initial recognition is 4.61% per annum, which was determined by discounting the estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the policy of 15 years, excluding the financial effect of surrender charge. At 31 December 2013, the expected life of the policy remained unchanged from the initial recognition and the directors considered that the financial impact of the option to terminate the policy was insignificant.

### Cash flow hedges

#### *Foreign exchange forward contracts*

The Group designated foreign exchange forward contracts as highly effective hedging instruments in order to manage the Group's foreign currency exposure in relation to foreign currency highly probable forecast sales to end customers denominated in United States Dollars ("US\$") by entering into foreign exchange forward contracts to sell US\$ for RMB. Management considers the hedges from the Group's perspective are effectively hedging its sales to end customers.

In addition, during the year ended 31 December 2012, the Company required its PRC subsidiaries (of which the functional currency is RMB) to use foreign exchange forward contracts to hedge its foreign currency exposure on intragroup highly probable forecast sales in HK\$ to group entities of which the sales to end customers were denominated in US\$. Management considered the hedges made by the PRC subsidiaries were highly effective and at the Group level, the hedges were effectively hedging its cost of sales which were mainly denominated in RMB affected by the movements of RMB relative to the sales to end customers, which were mainly denominated in US\$.

At the end of the reporting period, the Group has outstanding foreign exchange forward contracts with an aggregate notional amount of US\$394 million (2012: US\$384 million) that requires the Group to sell US\$ for RMB at exchange rates ranging from RMB6.407 to RMB6.442 (2012: RMB6.251 to RMB6.442) for US\$1 with maturity periods up to 24 months (2012: 24 months) from the end of the respective reporting period. The terms of the foreign exchange contracts have been negotiated based on the estimation of the highly probable forecast sales.

As at 31 December 2013, the cumulative net fair value gain of approximately HK\$154,269,000 (2012: HK\$1,008,000) recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in hedging reserve is expected to be released to the profit or loss at various dates from January 2014 to December 2015 (2012: January 2013 to December 2014), the period in which the forecast sales are expected to take place. Included in the cumulated net fair value gain was HK\$66,728,000 (2012: HK\$5,235,000) that is expected to be reclassified to profit or loss in more than twelve months after the end of the reporting period.

During the year, the effective portion of cash flow hedges on foreign currency forward contracts amounting to HK\$30,109,000 (2012: HK\$36,948,000) is reclassified from other comprehensive income upon occurrence of the sales to end customers which affected the profit or loss.

#### *Interest rate swaps*

The Group used interest rate swaps to manage its exposure to volatility in interest payments relating to certain floating rate bank borrowings. The floating-to-fixed interest rate swaps locked the interest rates ranging from 1.95% to 3.06% (2012: 2.03% to 3.07%) per annum. The interest rate swaps match the major terms of the hedged underlying bank borrowings such that management considered that the interest rate swaps are highly effective hedging instruments.

As at 31 December 2013, the fair value loss of HK\$642,000 (2012: HK\$385,000) of interest rate swap contracts has been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in hedging reserve, and are expected to be released to profit or loss at various dates during the lives of the swaps when the hedged interest expenses are recognised and impacts profit or loss. The aggregate notional amount of interest rate swap contracts are HK\$1,450,000,000 (2012: HK\$1,188,000,000) and will mature within one year after the end of the reporting period.

The effective portion of cash flow hedges on interest rate swaps amounting to HK\$1,414,000 (2012: HK\$1,325,000) is reclassified from other comprehensive income to profit or loss and included in finance costs during the year.

### Other derivatives (not under hedge accounting)

#### *Dual currency interest rate swap*

The amount represents fair value of a dual currency interest rate swap. In accordance with the agreement, the Group shall pay fixed interest of 1% per annum on the notional amount of HK\$70 million on 20 January 2014 and 2.1% per annum annually from 20 January 2014 to 20 January 2019. In return, the Group shall receive floating interest at Hong Kong Interbank Offered Rate ("HIBOR") on the notional amount of HK\$70 million quarterly from 20 April 2012 to 20 January 2019. In addition, the Group shall pay or receive interest on the notional amount of US\$9,014,000 annually based on the formula set out in the agreement, while the interest rate that the Group may be required to pay is capped as 2% per annum. The fair value gain of HK\$3,353,000 (2012: fair value loss of HK\$10,035,000) is recognised in profit or loss.

#### *Capped forward contracts*

The amount represents fair value of capped forward contracts with aggregate notional amount of US\$96 million (2012: US\$168 million). The Group shall pay if the spot rate of RMB vs US\$ is above the upper contract rate or receive if the spot rate of RMB vs US\$ is below the lower contract rate specified in the relevant agreements on the settlement date. Where the spot rate is above the upper contract rate on the settlement date, the Group shall pay the amount multiplied by two to respective banks. Where the spot rate falls within the upper and lower contract rates, no settlement will be required. The aforesaid upper and lower contract rates in the relevant agreements are ranging from RMB6.27 to RMB6.48 vs US\$1 and RMB6.206 to RMB6.44 vs US\$1 (2012: RMB6.375 to RMB6.585 vs US\$1 and RMB6.31 to RMB6.4725 vs US\$1) respectively. The contracts will be settled in various dates from January 2014 to December 2015 (2012: January 2013 to June 2015).

The fair value gain, including the gain on those contracts entered into and settled during the year, of HK\$8,582,000 (2012: HK\$35,103,000) is recognised in profit or loss.

#### *Knock out forward contract*

The amount represents the fair value of a knock out non-deliverable forward contract of US\$24 million to sell US\$1 million, on a monthly interval from January 2014 to December 2015, for RMB at the contracted rate of US\$1 for RMB6.2 where the spot rate on the settlement date is below the contracted rate. Where the spot rate is above the contracted rate, the Group has to sell double the amount of US\$ for RMB at the contracted rate. The contract will be terminated when the cumulated spot rate at each settlement date exceeds the contracted forward rate by a specific amount set out in the agreement.

The fair value gain, including the gain on those contracts entered into and settled during the year, of HK\$5,315,000 (2012: fair value loss of HK\$408,000) is recognised in profit or loss.

#### *Dual currency forward contract*

At 31 December 2012, the amount represented fair value of dual currency forward contract that the Group should exchange RMB and US\$ at exchange rate at RMB6.58 for US\$1 with an aggregated notional amount of US\$6 million settled monthly from January 2013 to December 2013. The contract would be settled on a net basis in either HK\$ or US\$ dependent on the spot rate on maturity date or at banks' discretions. The fair value gain, including the gain on those contracts entered into and settled during the year, of HK\$1,239,000 (2012: HK\$14,141,000) is recognised in profit or loss.

The above derivatives are measured at fair value at the end of the reporting period. Their fair values are determined based on the valuation carried out by financial institutions, which are measured using the present value of future cash flows estimated and discounted based on the applicable yield curves derived from quoted interest rates and quoted forward exchange rates at the end of the reporting period. ## 36. SHARE OPTION SCHEME

The purposes of the share option scheme adopted on 30 May 2012 (the "New Scheme") are to (a) provide alternative recognition to the contributions or services of employees, executives and non-executive directors; (b) strengthen the relationship between the Group and its employees and executives; (c) attract and retain key and important employees and executives; and (d) motivate employees and executives to strive for future development and expansion of the Group. Eligible participants of the New Scheme include the directors and employees of the Group. Unless otherwise terminated or amended, the New Scheme will remain in force for 10 years ending 29 May 2022.

Pursuant to the New Scheme, the total number of shares which may be issued upon exercise of all outstanding options granted and yet to be exercised under the New Scheme and any other schemes shall not exceed 30% of the issued share capital of the Company from time to time. The total number of shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of options granted in accordance with the New Scheme to each eligible participant in any 12-month period must not exceed 1% of the shares of the Company in issue. The offer of a grant of share option may be accepted within 28 days from the date of the offer with no consideration being payable by the grantee. The exercisable period of the share options granted is determinable by the directors, but no later than 10 years from the date of the offer. The subscription price for the shares in respect of which options are granted is determinable by directors, but must be at least the highest of (1) the closing price of the Company's shares as stated in the Stock Exchange's daily quotations sheet on the date of grant of the option; (2) the average closing price of the Company's shares as stated in the Stock Exchange's daily quotations sheets for the five business days immediately preceding the date of grant of the option; and (3) the par value of the Company's shares.

Share options do not confer rights on the holders to dividends or to vote at shareholder's meeting.

No share options were granted, exercised, cancelled or lapsed under the New Scheme during the year nor outstanding as at the end of the reporting period.

The Group manages its capital to ensure that entities in the Group will be able to continue as a going concern while maximising the return to shareholders through the optimisation of the debt and equity balance. The Group's overall strategy remains unchanged from prior year.

The capital structure of the Group consists of debt, which includes the bank borrowings disclosed in note 32, net of cash and cash equivalents, and equity attributable to owners of the Company, comprising issued share capital, reserves and accumulated profits.

The directors of the Company review the capital structure on a continuous basis. As part of this review, the directors consider the cost of capital. The Group will balance its overall capital structure through the payment of dividends, the share buy-backs, the issue of new shares as well as the issue of new debt or the redemption of existing debt.

The Group has entered into certain foreign exchange forward contracts as set out in note 20 to hedge against the potential currency exposure arising on the forecast intragroup sales and forecast sales to external parties. The Group is exposed to fair value interest rate risk in relation to fixed rate bank deposits, loan receivables and fixed rate bank borrowings. The Group is also exposed to cash flow interest rate risk relating to the variable rate bank borrowings, structured deposits and derivative financial instruments including receive-floating and pay-fixed interest rate swaps, which mainly concentrated on fluctuation of HIBOR and LIBOR. Management monitors interest rate exposure and consider hedging significant interest rate exposure should the need arise. The critical terms of these interest rate swaps are similar to those of hedged borrowings. These interest rate swaps are designated as effective hedging instruments and hedge accounting is used (see note 20 for details).

##### Sensitivity analysis

The sensitivity analyses below have been determined based on the exposure to interest rates for both derivatives and non-derivative instruments. #### *Credit risk*

The Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which will cause a financial loss to the Group due to failure to perform an obligation by the counterparties arising from the carrying amount of the respective recognised financial assets as stated in the consolidated statement of financial position.

In order to minimise the credit risk, management of the Group has delegated a team responsible for determination of credit limits, credit approvals and other monitoring procedures to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debts. In addition, the Group reviews the recoverable amount of each individual trade debt at the end of the reporting period to ensure that adequate impairment losses are made for irrecoverable amounts. In this regard, the directors of the Company consider that the Group's credit risk is significantly reduced.

Other than concentration of credit risk on the major customers, loan receivables, structured deposits and liquid funds deposited with several banks and insurance company with high credit ratings, as well as counterparties with whom the Group enters into derivative financial instruments, the Group has no significant concentration of credit risk, with exposure spread over a number of counterparties and customers, spread across geographical areas. In order to minimise the credit risk from the major customers, the term of payment of the major customers are under bank's letter of credit. The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit ratings assigned by international credit-rating agencies.

#### *Liquidity risk*

In the management of the liquidity risk, the Group monitors and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate by management to finance the Group's operations and mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows. Management monitors the utilisation of bank borrowings and ensures compliance with loan covenants.

The Group relies on bank borrowings as a significant source of liquidity. As at 31 December 2013, the Group has available unutilised banking facilities of approximately HK\$1,846 million (2012: HK\$2,024 million).

The following table details the Group's remaining contractual maturity for its non-derivative financial liabilities. The table has been drawn up based on the undiscounted cash flows of financial liabilities based on the earliest date on which the Group can be required to pay. Specifically, bank loans with a repayment on demand clause are included in the earliest time band regardless of the probability of the banks choosing to exercise their rights. ## 45. RETIREMENT BENEFITS SCHEMES

The Group operates a mandatory provident fund scheme (the "MPF Scheme") for all qualifying employees of the Group in Hong Kong. The Group follows the minimum contribution requirement of 5% of eligible employees' relevant aggregated income with a cap of HK\$1,000 per month before 1 June 2012 and revised to HK\$1,250 per month thereafter. The assets of the MPF Scheme are held separately from those of the Group, in funds under the control of the trustees. The employees of the subsidiaries in the PRC are members of retirement benefits schemes operated by the PRC government. The contributions are charged to the profit or loss as incurred. The relevant PRC subsidiaries are required to make contributions to the state retirement schemes in the PRC based on a certain percentage of the monthly salaries of their current employees to fund the benefits. The employees are entitled to retirement pension calculated with reference to their basic salaries on retirement and their length of service in accordance with the relevant government regulations. The PRC government is responsible for the pension liability to these retired staff.
